The Gospel and Baptism by Duane Patton

W ithout any controversy, the matter of baptism as related to the faith in Jesus was not an issue for several hundred years after the New Testament came into effect. Jesus taught Nicodemus (a ruler of the Jews) about its relation to the new birth and the kingdom of heaven, and later, after His resurrection and just prior to His ascension, He commanded it as a matter of discipleship to endure until the end of the human experience (John 3:3-5; Matthew 28:18-20). It should come as no surprise to the reader of God's holy word that the official spokesmen for Christ included baptism in the first Gospel sermon ever recorded as having been preached. After all, these early evangelists understood much about baptism that so few seem to understand today and about which many of whom strongly oppose.

Luke recorded Peter as having preached the Gospel to thousands of Jews who had gathered for the annual celebration of Pentecost. The main point of Peter's sermon was this: "...let all the house of Israel know assuredly that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ" (Acts 3:26). Being convinced by the earlier points Peter brought up about Jesus' death, burial and resurrection as confirmed by eyewitness testimony, miracles, and prophecy, many were deeply moved by the evidence of their guilt and need of God's mercy. So, they asked Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" to which Peter announced, "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (2:38a). We later learn from the text that around 3,000 people did what Peter and the other apostles commanded. From that moment forward, and throughout the remaining biblical record, the necessity of immersion into a watery grave that symbolized the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus became an essential part of the Gospel message just as necessary and no more a work of human merit than that of hearing the message of Jesus and believing it, repentance from sin and confession of belief that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. Since the plan of God clearly identifies baptism as a crucial part of our faith in Jesus, who are we to neglect it or reject it? In the end, please allow me to borrow a few words of Scripture, "Therefore we must give the more earnest heed to the things we have heard, lest we drift away." (Hebrews 2:1)
